
The event was organised by EBP Kent

Through interviewing many companies at the event, the reporters discovered that apprenticeships and a range of careers are readily available to inspire people to get involved with the working world.

From high up in space to the depths of the ocean, Marine Biology presents a whole range of careers, writes *Sophie*. 'I am hoping you find ten people who are interested because there are around ten main jobs in this area.' Those words were said by the marine biologists standing behind the table on which lay a box of aquatic wonders. The biologist would rest people on how many species they could name as they walked past.

In this sector, budding environmentalists can follow the path that leads to a career in pollution clean-up. A marine vet was among other jobs and those who prefer to work inside can do lab work. This informative section was truly eye-opening.

Glowing hot gas in spectrotubes graced the tables at the physics section bearing a sharp resemblance to glow sticks. The bright colours drew people in as the physicist discussed how these coloured tubes help us to look into space and examine the stars and their evolution.

If loyalties lie with saving lives then perhaps biomedical science is for you. Within this career you are able to examine blood for infections as well as diagnosing cancer. When asked if the job was reward-

ing, the scientist said: 'Yes you can help others so it's great.'

Helping people leads to helping toddlers learning skills for their futures. A range of toys, including tills and artistic activities can widen knowledge in a fun way. To work in a pre-school (such as East Peckham Pre-School) you must enjoy

being with young children. In another corner, a swarm of students gather excitedly to observe the remote control 4x4s being driven by lucky onlookers. The leaflets explain that this project can improve students' science technology, engineering and maths (known as STEM). The project leaders travel to schools and stu-



dents work in teams to create their own 4x4 controllable machines.

To join the Royal Navy, one must take part in a fitness test as well as a formal interview. We spoke to two engineers and they said: 'You have pride of serving your country. A passion for sport and travel is essential in this career.'

Stixx are pieces of newspaper rolled up and glued before being placed in a machine. When this process is completed you are left with a material that is immensely strong. The stixx are used for building and construction training.

In another corner of the room sit six objects—too glamorous to be described as severed heads! Artistic hairstyles rest on the heads of mannequins while real-life students engage by getting their hair styled, curled and straightened. Hairdressers are expected to be confident, artistic and sociable.

Hospice of the Weald

We're a local charity – we give aid to people with life limiting illnesses. We have lots of vacancies but you have to be over 16 years old.

We offer apprentices, fundraiser vacancies. You have to have at least 5 GCSEs but you don't need a degree. However, for senior roles, experience is needed. We offer 4 different apprenticeships.

We are looking for people with previous volunteer work—did you know, over 80% of the people who work at Hospice of the Weald are volunteers?

Connexions

Our company work with young people between the ages of 13 and 19. We help young people with careers and also troubled young people. We mainly employ young people to be personal advisors to others, however we do not normally higher young people. You have to be over 21 and have experience of working with young people. We look for variety in our future employees – people who have worked with young people and are very good listeners. We have one admin apprenticeship for young people.

Kent Apprenticeships

We offer apprenticeships in Kent as we're part of the KCC. At the moment we have a lot of vacancies as we have different projects going on and there are lots of opportunities to join in. Business admin is popular. You don't need any qualifications but you have to demonstrate good maths and English skills and show that you want to be apart of this organisation.

No experience is necessary to take an apprenticeship but you need to show a keen interest for learning and all training is provided.

NHS

We look after patients with a huge variety of illnesses. We usually have lots of vacancies; doctors, nurses, admin, engineers and workmen.

To become a doctor or nurse you need GCSEs, A-Levels and a medical degree whereas admin people may just need to have taken a secretarial course.

We look for enthusiasm, dedication, motivation and commitment in all our potential employees. We offer apprenticeships as decorators and training and work experience for doctors and nurses.
